

KANSAS RANKS 5th IN THE NATION FOR FORMAL VOLUNTEERING



AmeriCorps, the federal agency for national service and volunteerism, has named Kansas as the fifth ranking state for formal volunteering in the nation as highlighted in the latest <u>Volunteering and Civic Life in America research</u>.

Kansas's formal volunteering rate has increased by eight percentage points in just two years. In 2023, 902,960 state residents volunteered through an organization, contributing \$1.6 billion dollars in economic value.

Other Kansas highlights:

- 96.7 percent of residents talked to or spent time with friends or family.
- 58.4 percent of residents informally helped others by exchanging favors with their neighbors.
- 71.0 percent of residents had a conversation or spent time with their neighbors.
- 34.5 percent of residents belonged to an organization.
- 54.4 percent of residents donated \$25 or more to charity.

"Kansas represents the best of America. Kansans should feel proud to know that their neighbors and friends are looking out for their community, providing invaluable support by serving those in need," said Michael D. Smith, CEO, AmeriCorps "We can all learn a thing or two from Kansans."

"The Kansas motto 'ad astra per aspera,' to the stars through difficulties, represents a feeling deeply rooted in each of us who call Kansas home. Across the state, we see communities harnessing the power of volunteerism to overcome hardships and meet critical community needs," said Dr. Jessica Dorsey, Kansas Volunteer Commission Executive Director. "We look forward to seeing the many positive ways that Kansans continue to rise to the challenge and serve in their communities."

Every two years, AmeriCorps partners with the US Census Bureau to conduct the most robust survey about civic engagement across the United States and over time. The data informs AmeriCorps' Volunteering and Civic Life in America research, a comprehensive look at how Americans make a difference in their communities and promote the common good. The latest research examines trends in formal volunteering, informal helping, and other civic behaviors.

The national volunteering rate has increased more than 22 percent in just two years. This is the largest expansion of formal volunteering AmeriCorps has ever recorded and truly showcases the spirit of volunteerism is on the rise in America.

Formal volunteering involves helping others through organizations. Through local nonprofit and community-based organizations, Americans are afforded new ways to engage with their communities and foster a sense of constructive action, civic participation and belonging. Volunteers support American schools and shelters, hospitals and hotlines, food banks, and civic, nonprofit, tribal and faith-based organizations across the country.

Volunteering doesn't always need to be formal. More than 137.5 million people – or 54 percent of Americans – helped their neighbors informally with tasks like running errands or watching each other's children between September 2022 and 2023. This represents a meaningful three percentage point increase from previous years.

<u>Disaster Recovery:</u> Deconstruction and rebuilding of homes, debris removal, or sorting donations after natural or other disasters



<u>Environment:</u> Habitat restoration, trail building, or interpretative programming



<u>Economic Opportunity:</u> Affordable housing construction, tax preparation, or community revitalization



<u>Veterans and Military Families:</u> Building facilities or structures to support veteran services and programming

AN AMERICORPS NCCC TEAM

NCCC members are young adults, 18-26 years old, who participate in a residential 10-month service term, and represent a wide variety of socioeconomic, cultural, geographic, and educational backgrounds.

Team sizes vary and can range from 6-12 Corps Members. Corps Members receive on-the-ground supervision from an NCCC Team Leader.

Each team is assigned to a unit that is led by a full-time, professional staff member called a Unit Leader. The Unit Leader oversees the team's project performance and member development.

Each team is provided with one 15-passenger van and fuel is covered by NCCC. Each team is also allocated funds for food and laundry. All members are background checked and fully insured by the Federal Tort Claims Act and Federal Employees Coverage Act.

SPONSOR REQUIREMENTS

- Provide on-site support including technical oversight, training, supplies, equipment, and a minimum of 20 hours of supervision per week
- Secure housing for the team for the duration of the project to include a bathroom, kitchen, sleeping quarters, separate quarantine quarters, and parking for one 15-passenger van

Complete and submit a NCCC Project Concept Form. This four-page document provides a brief overview of the applying organization and their tentative project plan for the team. This document is required for all organizations to be able to proceed with the full application.



Upon review of the Project Concept Form, NCCC will invite the organization to submit a full application or request additional information.



Complete and submit a NCCC Project Application with required supporting documentation.



Applications are reviewed by a panel and awarded with consideration to compelling need, geographic distribution, availability of teams, and costs related to team deployment, in addition to the evaluation criteria listed in the application instructions.

<u>Disaster response or recovery</u>: Sheltering, feeding, damage assessments, donation management, mucking and gutting, temporary roof repair, hazard tree and debris removal, emergency mold suppression, rebuilding of homes, re-clearing of trails, and restoration of other structures or environmental features lost or damaged in a disaster.



Affordable Housing: Renovating and/or constructing homes, including hardwall installation and flooring installation.



Environmental Stewardship and/or Climate Mitigation: Energy efficiency, agriculture and food systems, or environmental stewardship/education.



Other: Energy Conservation, Infrastructure Improvement, Urban and Rural Development or other priorities identified by your organization.
